She works with clinicians, educators, coaches and workplace professionals to raise awareness of brain health. Mimma is the Cogmed Manager for Pearson Clinical and Talent Assessment in Australia and New Zealand and a regular speaker on the fascinating topic of neuroplasticity. Her presentations will focus on understanding working memory and its implications for learning plus what is going on in the brain and body when someone is learning successfully.

Sandy Russo is a registered teacher and the Acting Director for SPELD South Australia. She is as an educational and software consultant, specialising in problem solving the needs of students with Specific Learning Disabilities. Sandy will be giving insights into strategies, good teaching practices and assistive technologies that can help students with SLDs and working memory problems to succeed independently in the classroom, university or workplace.

Angus Hikairo MacFarlane: has a background in teaching and cultural psychology and is currently Professor of Maori Research at the University of Canterbury. Angus is a highly respected researcher, author and speaker, renowned for promoting outcomes of Maori students.
